- Our **emergency** preparedness and response programmes reached more than 11 million people, with special emphasis on the most vulnerable: women, children and the elderly.

CARE's membership

CARE International is an international confederation composed of twelve national Members. Each CARE Member is an autonomous non-governmental organisation in its own right, registered and poverty and to provide emergency relief.

In pursuit of this purpose, CARE Members carry out a range of project-related, advocacy, fundraising and communications activities, which reflect both their own priorities and the needs of the countries in which their projects are implemented.

CARE's Country Offices

In any given country where CARE works, all programmes and projects are implemented through a single integrated presence, termed the Country Office, which operates under the management of a single CARE Member. All CARE Members are entitled to participate in any Country Office programme by becoming involved in project identification and design, and through the subsequent provision of technical assistance, financing, human resources and other kinds of support. In all cases, participation occurs within the context of the Country Office strategic plan and its programme and programme support structures.


The CARE International Secretariat

CARE International's governance

CARE International's membership and its Country Offices operate according to the policies and provisions of the CARE International Code, and pursue shared organisational priorities contained in the CARE International Strategic Plan.

CARE International is governed by the CARE International Board. The Board consists of an independent chairperson, plus two representatives from each of the twelve national CARE Members (one of whom is the chief executive, and the other a trustee of the national CARE board).

The Board meets up to twice a year, and maintains an Executive Committee to conduct its work between meetings. Three other Board committees, plus a set of four sub-committees (consisting mainly of staff), together act on CARE's priorities, including those contained in the CARE International Strategic Plan.
