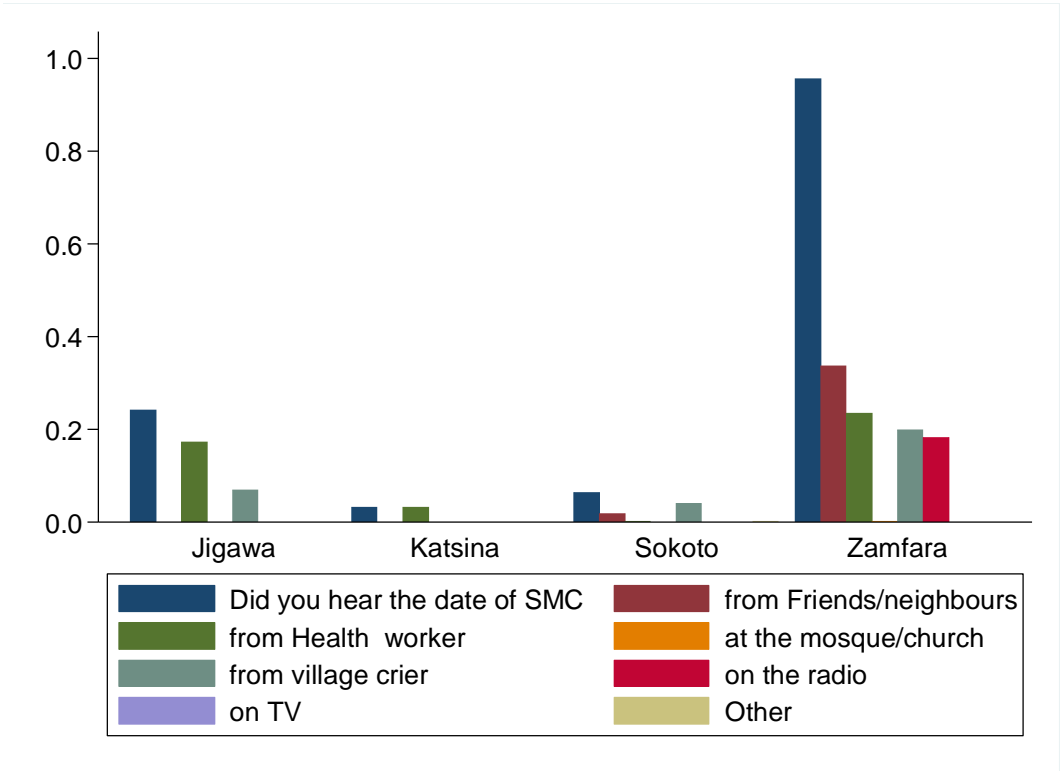


Nigeria Faso Coverage Report – SMC Cycle 2 2017

Notes: Survey took place between 8th September and 13th September 2017, in 66 clusters in Zamfara Sokoto, Jigawa and Katsina. A total of 1,545 households were visited and 99.4% (1535/1545) agreed to participate in the survey, the reasons for non-response (10/1545) were; the inability to find someone to speak with (n=1); no children aged between 3 months and 7 years (n=8) and interviewers unable to access compound (n=1).

Overall coverage was 74.5%. Coverage by state is shown in Table 5. The most common reason given for not receiving SMC was that the health worker did not visit. Coverage of SMC amongst older children (6 or more years old) and was 51.1%.
